






Social auditing: the context

- Ever-going need for transparency and traceability in social and labor conditions
- Multiplication of standards and audit frameworks
- Audit= Systematic, documented process for obtaining records, statements of fact or other relevant information, objectively assessed to determine the extent to which specified requirements are fulfilled



What does "audit fatigue" mean?

- Lack of **consensus** on sustainability standards
- Duplication, redundancy of frameworks
- Increasing reliance on audits: complexity, frequency, scope
- Conflicts of interests, budgetary constraints& audit duration, risks of fraud
- Audit fatigue= Duplications resulting in high costs and effort, perception as routine task, higher risk of incidents
- Contradiction with objective of the audit= selfimprovement, transparency, and compliance







The reality for MSMEs

- Lack of resources, higher transaction costs, lack of access to networks, more vulnerable to challenging economic conditions& supply-chain disruptions
- SMEs: difficulty to navigate the legal environment
- Predominant role in the garment and footwear sector
- Jobs creation, innovation and economic diversification
- Employment opportunities for vulnerable groups including migrant, women, young and older workers



The Solution? A converged social assessment

In 2015, 30+ industry stakeholders united to establish **SLCP** to create a converged social assessment to reduce 'audit fatigue.'



What is SLCP today?

SLCP is a global multi-stakeholder initiative that:

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Collects harmonised, accessible and trusted social and labor supply chain **data**



Through deploying a **common** social assessment



That replaces the need for repetitive audits and **frees up resources** for preventing and mitigating adverse human rights impacts

Unlocking resources through SLCP

67% of SLCP signatories use the CAF instead of proprietary tools	Potential of \$26 million USD unlocked through the CAF in 2023	37% of signatories redirected resources due to SLCP implementation in 2022†
52% of facilities whose buyers accept SLCP data saved money on audit expenses ₽	59% reported savings of up to \$5000 USD annually P	74% reported re- investing these savings in the work-place 卪




